
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


OPO Local Service Areas (square miles)








Dedicated Organ Recovery Process

Organ Donors and Livers Recovered Since 12/2001




(1870 organ donors including 320 DCDs)



754 LCNW Organ Donors



Anchorage, AK = 1450 miles Billings, MT = 820 miles Spokane, WA = 280 miles






Success Factors for Collaboration

- Shared goals of maximizing donation and transplantation volumes and outcomes
- Trusted and skilled dedicated organ recovery staff and Medical Advisors
- Close communication between recovery staff and transplant programs during recovery process
- Regular scheduled joint meetings to review organ utilization and quality metrics
- Frequent in-person communication and feedback
- Shared interest in quality improvement




LCNW Average Donors per Month






Liver Utilization

Challenges and opportunities:

- Surgical errors-minimal
- DCD procurements- the dedicated procurement model has enhanced donor opportunities and established technical excellence
- Multiple donors with overlapping procurements- logistical nightmare for recipient hospital receiving thoracic and abdominal organs
- Intermittency of donors- limitations on ECD donors, given decreased opportunities for early retransplantation if needed
- Logistics of Recipient operation- commits to utilization of organ, and the hazards of mis-communication/poor assessment of graft quality/logistics of transportation
- Liver graft assessment- Biopsy assessment of variable utility
